KAREN'S KORNER

In September we enjoyed presentations by various lodge members of their impressive craft and genealogical skills. Following along with that theme, this month's featured book is "The Folk Arts of Norway" by Janice Stewart. I purchased this book at the bookstore at Vesterheim in Decorah. This is the 3rd printing of the original book from 1953 and is considered a reference for those interested in Norwegian crafts. It covers the basic arts of: Carving, Rosemaling, Weaving, Embroidery, Costumes, and Silverwork. This is a wonderful historical work, detailing the evolution of these crafts through the centuries, some following European trends, others uniquely Norwegian. Instead of visiting a museum, check out this book and enjoy the numerous black-and-white and colored photographs of the crafts of Norway.

The Carving chapter discusses how the designs evolved from the fierce dragon-motives of the Viking era to more delicate patterns of grapevines, rosettes, shells, and egg & dart design. The Rosemaling chapter explains the patterns and colors that are unique to each region of Norway. In the Weaving chapter, there is a short description of the Baldishol Church Tapestry, one of our recent lodge programs. The Embroidery chapter displays stunning examples of intricate handwork, some used to decorate Bunads of the various regions. Even if you don't want to bother with the historical text, the pictures are superb. In the chapter on Costumes, we learn about the evolution of what we consider a "traditional" Norwegian outfit of black breeches with a red jacket and silver buttons, a new trend in the fjordlands toward the end of the 18th century. The chapter on Metalwork displays photos of iron-cased trunks, candle holders, fine jewelry, buttons and earrings, drinking horn, etc., some patterns borrowed from highly-skilled German metal-workers.

Additional chapters have been added to this reprinting, one called "North Norway" that features crafts of the Sami (Laplander groups). The Sami had harsher living conditions and less time to produce decorated items. Utilitarian items they produced were wooden-ware: ale bowls, spoons, baskets, cups, ladles, storage casks, and travel chests. The chapter entitled "Vikings and Farmers" provides a history or origin of some of the designs, Viking, Romanesque, and Gothic, still used today. The building of the log cabin or a boat is a craft, with methods honed through the decades. Creating furniture for the cabin is something utilitarian but can also become a beautiful decorated piece. The book contains many examples of decorated furniture such as tables, benches, cupboards, break-fronts, build-in-beds, and kubbestols (chairs).

If you are interested in cultural skills, our library has a large binder containing the requirements for each of the cultural skills recognized by the international headquarters of the Sons of Norway. I can make copies of a hand-out for you if you are interested in attaining a skill level in a certain craft.

The Viking Home-The Longhouse



On August 20th, Adrian and Ramona Johnson, Shirley Schoenfeld and Marilyn Rudser drove to Stratford WI, to attend a SON Zone Meeting. Owen Christianson and his wife hosted the gathering at the new longhouse constructed by Owen. The design was unique to the Viking age--large wooden timbers made up the home, held together by wooden pegs, and notched along the boards so the structure held together.

Viking homes were long rectangular buildings. Often one end was used as a barn where crops were stored and also horses and cattle. This kept the Viking home warm and the cattle were safe. The fireplace would be somewhere in the middle of the floor. This is how Owen built theirs, without a chimney. The smoke went up through an opening in the roof. The Christiansons cooked lamb stew over the fire pit, in a copper kettle suspended on iron supports. Benches ran along the inside walls. We sat on these during our meeting and also during our coffee time and lunch break. The Vikings used these benches for beds, rolling up in animal hides to keep warm.

The Christianson's long house is about 12 by 20 feet and they plan to use it for entertaining guests, working on crafts and helping keep the Viking history alive. Thank you to the Christianson's for hosting this very interesting event.

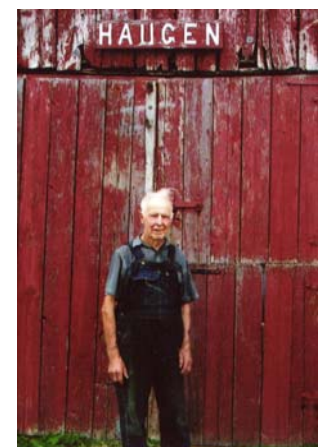

Sami Culture Program by Kathleen Sweeney



Wergeland member **Kathi Sweeney** from Madison provided the program for the Holmen Historical Society on September 7. She told of her travel to the Arctic regions of Scandinavia and interest in the culture of the Sami people. Her special interest was in the crafts with emphasis on their unique pewter embroidery. This is accomplished by forming intricate, geometric patterns using very fine pewter wire stitched into place on fabric and costumes. She showed examples of their work and told of the Winter Market. This is a festival of arts and crafts that dates back to the 1600's, in which they offer their hand-made crafts and products for sale on a weekend in winter. Many in the audience were Wergeland members who are Society members or guests.

a little in English...

Bunad Copies

The Norwegian institute for bunad and folk costumes gives counsel about traditional costume standards which is the basis for today's bunads. The majority of bunads are a result of a painstaking reconstruction process of extinct folk costumes. It is, however, a common misunderstanding that bunads have always existed and that they can therefore be freely copied. Such pirated copies are the closest one can come to being illegal in the context of bunads. In some cases it is (by law) illegal to copy a bunad. But, in the majority of cases, it is not because bunads are poorly copyrighted. There are many reasons for this.

One of them is that those who prepared bunads in their time did not anticipate this issue. Husflid outlets sold fabric packages to people that sewed their own bunads, or who sewed bunads for their company.

Another reason lies in the legislation. To obtain protection through design laws or copyright acts, the design must be new and have an individual character, something that often works against a bunad's character. The marketing law has varying success in that it is difficult to judge what is "contrary to good business practice" (§25) or "an unfair exploitation of another's work or results and creates a risk for confusion" (§30).

Bunadkopier

Norsk institutt for bunad og folkedrakt gir råd om tradisjonell draktskikk som grunnlag for dagens bunader. De fleste bunader er resultat av en møysommelig rekonstruksjonsprosess av utdødde folkedrakter. Det er imidlertid en vanlig misforståelse at bunadene alltid har eksistert og at de derfor er frie til å kopieres. Denne piratkopieringen er det nærmeste man kommer ulovlig i bunadsammenheng. I noen tilfeller er det (juridisk) ulovlig å kopiere en bunad. Men i de aller fleste tilfeller er det ikke det, fordi bunadene er dårlig opphavsrettslig beskyttet. Dette har flere årsaker.

En av dem er at de som utarbeidet bunadene i sin tid ikke så denne problemstillingen komme. Husflidsutsalgene solgte materialpakker til folk som sydde bunadene sine selv, eller sydde bunadene for dem.

En annen årsak ligger i selve lovverket. For å få beskyttelse gjennom designloven eller åndsverkloven må designet være nytt og ha individuell karakter. Noe som ofte strider mot bunadens karakter. Markedsføringsloven blir med varierende hell brukt, fordi det er vanskelig å dømme hva som «strider mot god forretningsskikk» (§25) eller «urimelig utnyttelse av en annens innsats eller resultater og fører med seg en fare for forveksling» (§30).
