As I write this, I'm leaving Flagstaff, Arizona to head back to Wisconsin. Coming here for a week after spending five weeks in Tucson has turned out to be a good way to re-acclimate me to snow and really cold temperatures. As rough as the weather's been for Madison this winter, I have to admit that I'm more tempted now than previously to become an annual "snowbird"!

Our Spring Frokost is coming up on Saturday, March 23rd, and Jerry Paulson again needs lots of volunteers to prep, serve and reset tables, donations of food items and baked goods for the buffet, and good old fashioned cash to make it a success. The proceeds from these would go to our Scandinavian Scholarship Fund. (Please pin a suggested price to each item, so we know what you feel your supplies and time were worth.)

Hopefully we'll get some warmer weather before then, as it'd be really nice to have our new handicapped ramp in place in time for the Frokost. Yes, the ramp pieces have arrived! They came in mid-January, in the middle of a snow storm, of course. Thanks to the efforts of my husband, Dennis, (I was already in AZ) they are now safely stored in the lodge basement. We'll save \$480 by assembling the ramp segments ourselves, so I'll be putting together a crew of volunteers to get this done in the next few weeks, with hopes for an early Spring. Do let me know if you'd be able to help; the sales rep has assured me that it's pretty easy to follow the accompanying instructions. However, the ramp can't actually be set up until we get warmer weather, so that ramp leg below-frost-level footings and a sidewalk between the end of the ramp and the parking lot can be poured. We weren't expecting to need footings, but the city required them in our building permit (and couldn't be talked out of them by me or our architect). So we will need to raise almost another \$1,000 to cover the extra cost. If you haven't donated toward the ramp yet, now would be a good time to do so; see the donation form on page 6.

We have some excellent programs coming up (see page 3), and I hope to see more of you attending as the weather gets better!

Bob Weaver

Bob and wife Barb have been members of Idun for many years; Barb joined Sons in 1972, and Bob came with her to our events prior to becoming a member in 1985. Even though Bob didn't have a drop of Norwegian blood, he adopted Barb's family traditions and was a truly active member. The Weavers have always been two of our biggest supporters for the Frokost and lutefisk dinners. Bob always enjoyed lefse-making, initially doing duty on the mixer and later he was a great ball-maker and packager.

Even some of us who knew him well weren't aware of his interesting background, as described in his obituary in the State Journal:



Bob was born on October 8, 1927, to Lem J. Weaver and Elvy Hughes in La Mesa, NM. He and his family (older brother John and sister Merle) were part of the great workers' migration of the 1930s, when his family was forced to take whatever work was available from the mining towns in New Mexico and Arizona to the orchard fields and forests of Oregon and California. Bob attended eight grammar schools and three high schools and was hard working from a very young age, undertaking a variety of youth jobs, including carrying water to silver miners and laying railroad ties. Bob was a great lover of the outdoors and animals. For fun he and John would catch wild donkeys and ride them over the summer, and while in Northern California he learned to love camping and fishing, a pastime that he continued to enjoy throughout his life.

After his high school graduation at age 17, Bob first tried to join the U.S. Navy by stowing away on a navy transport with John, only later to be officially enlisted with his parents' support. He served from 1945 to 1954 at the U.S. Naval Air Station in Oakland, Calif. Beginning his career as a Storekeeper 3rd class, Bob worked in various positions, and achieved the rank of Disbursing Clerk 1st class. After an honorable discharge he went on to be an active Naval Reservist with the U.S. Naval Surface Division—Seabees in Madison until 1968. During his service he received numerous commendations and was consistently praised for excellent service and performance of the highest caliber.

Bob married the love of his life, Barbara Ann Flood, in 1951 while stationed in Oakland. They moved to Madison in 1952 and lived on the Central and West sides of Madison for more than 50 years where they had three children, Mary, Michael and Thomas.

Bob worked for 34 years as a Permit Supervisor for the State Dept. of Transportation-Highway Division, until his retirement in 1989. He was also an active member of Bethel Lutheran Church, ushering there for more than 30 years, and continued to be active with the Christian Men's and Friendly Visitors groups.

Bob is survived by his wife of 62 years, Barbara; three children, Mary (Jeff), Michael (Teresa) and Thomas (Rachel); and seven grandchildren, Evan, Lucas, Amy, Sara, Ruby, Matilda and Abigail; as well as his sister, Merle.

A memorial service was held at Bethel Lutheran Church on February 9th. Bob's cremains will be interred at the Bonnet Prairie Cemetery in a private service at a later date.

We extend our sincere condolences to Barb and her children and grandchildren. Bob and Barb have donated to our Handicapped Access Fund, and we encourage you to donate to this fund in Bob's memory.

A Little in English...

The Sami Easter Festival (March 27 – April 1, 2013)

The Sami culture is alive even today. The famous Easter festival is an example of this, an annual event with proud traditions. Easter was the time of year when Sami from throughout the region gathered in Kautokeino. They celebrated the end of the long winter and its darkness with religious parties and weddings.

85% of residents in Kautokeino are Sami speakers, and one of three work with reindeer. Kautokeino has the largest reindeer community.

At Easter, the sun has returned, and daytime temperatures are pretty manageable. It is the beginning of the Easter festival. Sami weddings receive thousands of guests, and bryllupsbidosen (stew) is served around wooden table settings. The Kautokeino community kicks off the whole Easter week with a good mix of party, fun, worshiping, cultural and exciting competitions.

Sami Grand Prix is a music competition with participants from all over Sápmi, with two classes of competition, joik and pop music. Joik is a living song tradition that is constantly evolving, so the material is entirely new. The class of pop music moves from joik inspired music to hard rock. Similar to the Eurovision Song Contest the audience decides the winner, so the Sami radio streams live and includes voting from across Lapland.

The concert goes on through Easter week is varied and includes Sami rock, jazz and joik inspired music and famous Norwegian artists. Often the country's most famous artist, Mari Boine, performs. The Sami theater there, Beaivváš provides a premiere location.

Nowhere in the world do you get so much Sami culture in such a short period of time during the Easter festival. To visit, however, requires some planning. Kautokeino is reached most easily by car, as there is a shortage of public transportation. Accommodation must certainly be organized in advance.

litt på norsk...

Nyttårsforsetter – er de tullete eller verdifulle?

Den samiske kulturen er levende, også i dag. Den berømte påskefestivalen er et eksempel, et årlig arrangement med stolte tradisjoner. Påsken var den tiden på året da samer fra hele regionen samlet seg i Kautokeino. Man feiret at den lange mørketiden var over med religiøse fester og bryllup.

85% av innbyggerne i Kautokeino er samisktalende, og en av tre jobber med reindrift. Kautokeino er Norges største reindriftskommune.

I påsken er sola tilbake, og dagtemperaturene ganske greie. Det er begynnelsen på påskefestivalen. Samiske bryllup fikk tusen gjester, og da serveres bryllupsbidosen (lapskausen) i tre bordsettinger. Befolkningen i Kautokeino har nå blitt vant til å sette av hele påskeuka til en god blanding av fest, moro, gudstjenester, kultur og spennende konkurranser.

Samisk Grand Prix er en musikkonkurranse med deltakelse fra hele Sápmi, og det konkurreres i to klasser, joik og popmusikk. Joik er en levende sangtradisjon i stadig utvikling, så materialet er nykomponert. Klassen for popmusikk beveger seg fra joikinspirert til hardrock. Akkurat som i Melodi Grand Prix er det publikum som avgjør, så sameradioen overfører direkte og avvikler stemmegivning over hele Sameland.

Konsertprogrammet påskeuka igjennom er variert, og omfatter samisk rock, jazz og joikinspirert musikk og landskjente, norske artister. Ofte er samelands mest kjente artist, Mari Boine, til stede. Det samiske teatret Beaivváš stiller gjerne opp med en premiere eller en markering. Ingen steder i verden får du så mye samekultur på så kort tid som under påskefestivalen. Å dra dit krever imidlertid litt planlegging. Kautokeino nås enklest med egen bil, da det er smått med offentlig transport. Overnatting må absolutt organiseres på forhånd.
