An Immigrant's Story from the Files of Audrey Halverson

Audrey Halverson submitted this obituary of her maternal great grandfather from a 1927 newspaper story by a H. A. Anderson in the *Whitehall Times*. I have used most of the actual article but summarized in parts. Quite a colorful obituary. Thank you ,Audrey, for submitting this.

Peder Simonson. 1939-1927

Peder Simonson, born in Loten, Hedmarken, Norway on October 8, 1839, was a practical pioneer and woodsman. He was the son of Simon and Anne Marie Lindsveen and was christened at the Vanga church in Norway. On January 9, 1866 he married Helene Wiverstad. He left Norway with his family in the summer of 1871 to Onalaska, WI. By 1874 he moved to the Fitch coulee near the town of Pigeon. His life was simple, direct, and unassuming. He was in the parlance of the west "a man's man" despising all fripperies and ostentations. He was generous and social. The core of his character was unswerving loyalty and sincerity.

He was typical of that class of men known in Norway as Husmandsonner - the sons of Housemen. A houseman was one who was permitted by a farmer or landlord to build a house and occupy and improve a small piece of land on the condition that whenever called on he should work for the landlord up to a certain number of days in the year. He never became owner of the land nor was there any lessening of the tribute he was to pay. The fortunes and comforts of Housemen varied according to the greed or generosity of their landlords. The children of Housemen were compelled to live on a plain and scant diet. They had to work hard and maybe forgo advantages of schools except what was necessary to fit them for confirmation. Sometime the parents were the only teachers these children had. Mr. Simonson said he had only three weeks of public schooling before confirmation. Children usually had to go out to work early in life trying to stay home until being confirmed. Mr. Simonson was sent into the mountains as a herder even before being confirmed. When he was stronger and older, he went to work in the woods and on the rapid streams that carried the logs to market. Here in America he spent 21 seasons in the pineries and was an expert axman.

Always of an unexcitable and equable temperament; full of humor and good nature that radiated from his person as naturally as light and heat does from the sun. He was fortunate in possessing wonderful health. Not until a few days before his death on March 11, 1927, was a doctor ever called for him in his 88 years. Seven of his eight

children were alive and lived within half an hour of his home which was with his son Peter near Coral City. His funeral was held in the lower church at Pigeon Falls. The sickness which brought an end to his long journey was brief. It also brought forth fruits from seeds planted in his mind and heart in childhood. Before his death he was repeating the Lord's Prayer, an old hymn, and parts of the Ten Commandments.

RECIPE FOR CARDAMOM ROLLS

While I am not a regular bread baker, I tried this recipe with success. I used ground cardamom and used a little less sugar.

2 cups milk

1/4 cup butter

1/4 cup margarine

1 pkg. active dry yeast

1/4 cup water, warm plus 1 Tbsp. sugar

3/4 cup sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

6 whole cardamom seeds, crushed

7 cups flour

Step 1

Scald milk. Add butter and margarine and let stand until melted, and milk is slightly cooled. Soften yeast in warm water with 1 tablespoon of sugar added.

In a large bowl add remaining sugar, salt, and cardamom. Pour in lukewarm milk mixture. Add yeast, and enough flour to make a stiff dough. Work thoroughly. Place in a greased bowl. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Punch down and shape into balls—the size of ping pong balls.

Preheat your oven to 450°F. Place 1" apart on a greased baking sheet. Cover with tea towel and let rise until doubled in bulk.

Bake in 450°F oven for 5 minutes. Yes, 5 minutes is right! Brush with butter while still hot. (I didn't trust 5 min. so went about 7 min. until golden brown.)
